One of just two active coaches to reach the 225-victory plateau, Mack Brown is in his 16th season as the head coach of the Texas Longhorns.

With a mark at Texas of 158-47 (.771), the 2008 Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year and the 2009 Big 12 Coach of the Year has elevated the Longhorns to new heights. The 2005 Paul W. "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year award winner and coach of the 2005 BCS National Champions, Brown is one of a handful of coaches in the history of college football to lead two separate programs to a top five national finish (also North Carolina).

A member of the Longhorn Hall of Honor, Brown's 244 career victories rank 10th on the NCAA all-time list. He is also one of only two coaches nationally to direct his teams to 21 bowls in the last 22 seasons and the only one to have 23 winning seasons in the last 24 years. Brown is also one of only seven active coaches at FBS schools to have won 100 games at their current school.

Those streaks are a reflection of the continuing success Brown has brought to a program that managed at least 10 wins just three times in the 15 years prior to his arrival in 1998, but has done so nine times in his 16 seasons, including a streak of nine consecutive that is tied for the second-longest in NCAA history.

Brown has also led the Longhorns to six seasons of at least 11 wins. Under Brown, Texas has won nine of its last 11 bowl games and has a 10-4 record overall, including a UT record streak of 12 consecutive bowl appearances. In the 15 years prior to Brown's arrival, Texas went to eight bowls and was 2-6. The 10 bowl wins give Brown the most in Texas history, surpassing Darrell Royal's eight. In addition, the streak includes a BCS National Championship, another BCS National Championship Game appearance and three BCS bowl wins.

The Horns have finished the year ranked in the Top 15 in 10 of the last 13 years, which includes a string of 10 straight. They also have seven Top 10 finishes and five Top Five rankings. Prior to Brown's arrival in 1998, the last time Texas had finished the year in the Top 10 was 1983. In addition, Texas leads the nation in all time appearances in the BCS rankings with 103, ahead of both Oklahoma (98) and Florida (92).

Excellence and consistency are nothing new to the coaching veteran of

41 years, including 30 as a head coach. Establishing stability has been a trademark of Brown's career, highlighted by his success at North Carolina and Texas. He rebuilt UNC after a series of disappointing seasons and turned it into a nationally-elite program.

Fresh off a season that saw North Carolina finish 11-1 and fourth nationally (USA Today/CNN), Brown was hired as the 28th head coach in the storied history of Texas football on Dec. 4, 1997.

In the 16 seasons since then, Brown's Longhorns squads have featured a Heisman Trophy winner, two runners-up and a third-place finisher, three Maxwell Award winners, three WCFF Player of the Year Award winners, two Doak Walker Award winners, two Thorpe Award winners, two Nagurski Trophy winners, two O'Brien Award winners a Butkus Award winner, a Lombardi Award winner, two Manning Award winners, a Hendricks Award winner, two Draddy/Campbell Trophy winners, a Wuerffel Trophy winner, a Disney Spirit Award winner, a FWAA Armed Forces Merit Award winner, 54 All-Americans, 73 first-team All-Big 12 selections, five Big 12 Offensive Players of the Year, six Big 12 Defensive Players of the Year and 12 Big 12 Freshman of the Year honorees.

During that time, UT has established one of the nation's premier offensive attacks, while rejuvenating a once struggling Longhorns' defense into one of the nation's best.

On offense, the Longhorns have set 137 school records and featured the school's only 3,000-yard passers (Colt McCoy, 2007, 08, 09/Vince Young, 2005/Chris Simms, 2002/Major Applewhite, 1999), 2,000-yard rusher (Ricky Williams, 1998), 1,000-yard receivers (Quan Cosby, 2008/Jordan Shipley, 2008, 09/Roy Williams, 2002, 03/Kwame Cavil, 1999/Wane McGarity, 1998) and 1,000-yard passer/rusher (Vince Young, 2004 and 05) in a season.

Defensively, Texas has led the Big 12 in scoring defense three times, in total defense seven times and four of the last six years, and rushing defense seven times and five of the last eight seasons.

With all of the success on the field, the primary emphasis has remained the same with Brown's squads — maintaining a high level of achievement in the classroom and in the community. Eighty percent of his players at North Carolina received their degrees and he has increased the pace at Texas, while more than a third of his players at Texas have regularly earned 3.0 grade point averages and achieved spots on the Big 12 Commissioner's and Athletics Director's honor rolls.

Over the last eight years, the success in the classroom has reached an all-time high. The Longhorns have led the Big 12 in academic all-conference selections in five of the last eight seasons, and in three of those have had equal or more first-team selections than all but two Big 12 schools have had total selections.

In March 2013, Brown was named the recipient of the Neyland Trophy, awarded annually by the Knoxville Quarterback Club for contributions to collegiate athletics. He and his wife, Sally, have four children — Matt, Katherine, Barbara and Chris — and three grandchildren Tyler, Mack and Bailey.

Game 1 — Texas vs. New Mexico State

AUSTIN, TEXAS — David Ash threw for 343 yards and four touchdowns and No. 15 Texas set a school record with 715 total offensive yards in a season-opening 56-7 win over New Mexico State.

Led by Ash, the Longhorns (1-0) scored on five straight possessions after falling behind 7-0, averaging 54.6 yards per play on the five touchdowns.

Texas reached the 700-yard mark in total offense for the first time in school history with a balanced attack, racking up 359 yards on the ground and 356 through the air. Ash had 91 yards on the ground, including a 55-yard TD run in the third quarter, while Joe Bergeron finished with 79 yards and Daje Johnson had 62. Brown recorded the first 100-yard receiving game of his career, turning three catches into 109 yards.

Jalen Overstreet, who didn't enter the game until midway through the fourth quarter, led the Longhorns with 92 rushing yards on nine carries. His two touchdowns were the first of his Texas career.

While Ash and the offense produced, the Texas defense forced three turnovers and shut down the Aggies after allowing their lone touchdown in the second quarter. Texas defensive ends Cedric Reed and Jackson Jeffcoat led the way with seven tackles apiece, including a sack for Reed.

Leading 35-7 following the third quarter, Texas kept its foot on the gas, scoring on all three of its possessions in the fourth quarter.

Mike Davis made an acrobatic 25-yard catch in the corner of the end zone to increase the lead to 42-7. Overstreet capped off his first drive as a Longhorn with a one-yard touchdown run, then added his second touchdown on a 38-yard run, completing the scoring for the Longhorns.

PROVO, UTAH — Brigham Young quarterback Taysom Hill ran for 259 yards and three touchdowns to lead the Cougars past No. 15 Texas, 40-21, at LaVell Edwards Stadium.

Texas quarterback David Ash went 19-of-34 for 251 yards and running back Jonathan Gray had 90 yards on 13 carries, but the Longhorns surrendered 550 rushing yards to BYU.

The Longhorns held an early 14-10 lead, but BYU scored 24 unanswered points – behind a pair of touchdown runs from Hill – to assume control.

Joe Bergeron's 2-yard rushing touchdown early in the second quarter gave Texas a 14-10 lead, but BYU answered less than three minutes later on a 20-yard run by Hill to take a lead it wouldn't surrender.

A touchdown run of 10 yards by Paul Lasike and a 32-yard field goal by Justin Sorensen just before halftime gave BYU a 27-14 lead going into the break. Hill's 26-yard touchdown run with 10:02 left in the third quarter stretched the lead to 34-14.

Ash connected with Mike Davis for a touchdown for the second time in the game on a 23-yard pass midway through the fourth quarter to cut the deficit to 34-21, but Texas would get no closer.

Sorensen kicked a pair of field goals – one from 36 yards and the last from 24 – to complete the scoring.

Ash was injured midway through the fourth quarter and Case McCoy entered the game. Despite a 45-yard pass to Jaxon Shiple, the Longhorns couldn't get on the board in the final stanza.

Duke Thomas made his first career interception and Malcom Brown recovered a fumble as the Longhorns won the turnover battle 2-0. Jordan Hicks (15) and Cedric Reed (14) both had career highs in tackles. The game was delayed nearly two hours due to rain and lightning

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Texas quarterback Case McCoy went 24 of 36 for 196 yards and a touchdown and running back Jonathan Gray ran for 91 yards, but No. 25/25 Ole Miss rallied to win 44-23 in sold out Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium.

The Longhorns built a 23-17 halftime lead behind McCoy, Gray and place-kicker Anthony Fera's three field goals. McCoy went 11 of 13 for 104 yards and a TD, while Gray ran for 88 yards in the first half.

Ole Miss quarterback Bo Wallace went 17 of 25 for 177 yards and two touchdowns while running back Jeff Scott ran for 164 yards on 19 carries and had 243 all-purpose yards on the night.

A 5-yard touchdown run from Scott and an 18-yard touchdown pass from Wallace to Donte Moncrief put the Longhorns in a 14-point hole early in the first quarter.

But the UT defense held the Rebels to 38 total yards on their next four possessions and McCoy got the offense on track with five straight scoring drives, including a touchdown pass to Mike Davis, scoring run by Gray and three Fera field goals to increase the lead to 23-14.

After Texas' offensive surge, the Rebels responded with 30 unanswered points.

Ole Miss scored three touchdowns in the third quarter when the Texas offense was only able to muster 48 yards of offense. Wallace ran for a 15-yard score and found Evan Ingram on a 17-yard touchdown pass, then Scott had a 73-yard punt return for a TD, increasing the Rebels' lead to 37-23.

Rebels running back Jaylen Walton provided the game's final points with an 8-yard touchdown run midway through the fourth quarter, putting the Rebels up 44-23.

The crowd of 101,474 was the third largest in stadium history.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Behind a career-high 141 rushing yards and two touchdowns from Johnathan Gray and a defense which forced three turnovers, Texas defeated Kansas State, 31-21, at Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium in the Big 12 Conference opener for both teams. The victory was the Longhorns' first over the Wildcats since 2003 and snapped a five-game losing streak.

Texas quarterback David Ash went 14 of 25 with 166 yards and a touchdown in the first half to help the Longhorns take a 17-7 halftime lead. Ash had concussion symptoms and didn't play after the halftime break, giving way to senior Case McCoy.

Three plays after the defense forced Kansas State's second punt of the game, Ash fired downfield and hit Kendall Sanders for a 63-yard touchdown. The play marked the sixth different Texas player to score a touchdown of 50 yards or longer this season.

Following a 21-yard touchdown run by Gray Texas took a commanding 17-0 lead.

The Wildcats crossed into UT territory for the first time with two minutes left in the first half and John Hubert got them on the board with a 15-yard touchdown run.

McCoy led the Longhorns to touchdowns on two of his first three drives, touchdown runs by Gray and Malcolm Brown. The Wildcats attempted to mount a rally late, but The Longhorns sealed the win with two fumble recoveries in the final three minutes, one from Dalton Santos and the other by Chris Whaley.

Texas finished with 227 rushing yards and 225 passing yards in the game. Texas' 452 total yards were the most in the 14 all-time meetings with Kansas State.

Steve Edmond led Texas with 11 tackles and the Longhorns had four sacks.

AMES, IOWA — Case McCoy's 1-yard touchdown run on a quarterback sneak with 51 seconds left lifted Texas over Iowa State, 31-30.

McCoy, who went 26 of 45 for 244 passing yards and a touchdown, led Texas on the game-winning 75-yard drive in a Big 12 Conference contest that featured six lead changes. Jonathan Gray ran 16 times for 89 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown run. Iowa State's Sam Richardson passed for 262 yards and rushed for another 83, though he was sacked five times. Running back Aaron Wimberly had 117 rushing yards and a touchdown for the Cyclones. Trailing 30-24 after the defense forced an ISU field goal, Texas got the ball back with less than four minutes left in the game. McCoy led the Horns down the field, and was eventually able to plunge the ball in from 1 yard out on third-and-goal.

Iowa State was unable to get in field-goal range on its final possession. The Cyclones moved the ball to the Texas 42, but Cedric Reed deflected a Richardson pass attempt with 13 seconds left and Jackson Jeffcoat picked it off to seal the win.

Texas jumped out to an early 10-0 lead with the help of a 45-yard Gray touchdown run and a field goal by Anthony Fera. However, the Cyclones responded in the second quarter with 13 consecutive points.

Texas was able to take a 17-13 lead on its final drive of the first half as McCoy eluded the pass rush and found John Harris for a 44-yard touchdown on the 'Hail Mary' toss.

The teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter, making the score 24-20 in Texas' favor.

But an Iowa State touchdown and field goal gave them a 30-24 before McCoy led the Horns on the game winning drive.

DALLAS, TEXAS — Case McCoy threw for 190 yards and two touchdowns, Johnathan Gray and Malcolm Brown both topped 100 rushing yards, and Texas never trailed in a 36-20 victory over No. 12/10 Oklahoma in the annual AT&T Red River Rivalry in the Cotton Bowl.

Gray ran a career-high 29 times for 123 yards and Brown added 120 yards on 23 carries. The Longhorns totaled 445 yards of offense, including 255 on the ground, while limiting Oklahoma to 263 total yards.

With the score tied 3-3 late in the first quarter, Whaley intercepted Oklahoma quarterback Blake Bell and returned it 31 yards for a touchdown.

The Longhorns extended the lead to 17-3 when McCoy connected with Marcus Johnson for a 59-yard touchdown on a beautifully thrown pass down the right sideline.

Anthony Fera hit a career-long 50-yard field goal to put Texas on top 20-3.

Oklahoma running back Damien Williams scored late in the half, but Texas countered with a 43-yard field goal by Fera that gave the Longhorns a 23-10 halftime lead.

After a Sooner field goal, the Longhorns got their second non-offensive touchdown of the game when Johnson returned a punt 85 yards for a touchdown, making the score 29-13 in favor of the Horns.

Following another Bell interception, this one by Duke Thomas, McCoy connected with Mike Davis on a long pass to extend the lead to 36-13.

Oklahoma scored on a McCoy interception early in the fourth quarter, but the Longhorns held on from there, stopping the Sooners on their final drive and using the running game to bleed out the clock.

Adrian Phillips led Texas with nine tackles, while Jackson Jeffcoat had two sacks. Cedric Reed and Quandre Diggs had one sack apiece. The Longhorn offensive line didn't surrender a sack all game.

FORT WORTH, TEXAS — Malcolm Brown ran for two touchdowns, Case McCoy threw for 228 yards and Texas' defense stifled TCU throughout in a 30-7 win that featured a lightning delay causing the game to end Sunday morning.

Texas used a balanced offensive attack to defeat the Horned Frogs, with Brown and Johnathan Gray accounting for 145 rushing yards and Marcus Johnson had a career-high 120 receiving yards.

Anthony Fera kicked three field goals to help the Longhorns hand TCU its first home loss of the season.

Texas' defense controlled the game throughout. The Longhorns gave up just 246 yards while also forcing three turnovers and accumulating three sacks.

Quandre Diggs set the tone when he strip-sacked quarterback Trevone Boykin on TCU's second possession of the game. Adrian Phillips recovered the fumble at the TCU 3-yard line and one play later, Brown ran it in to give the Longhorns a 7-0 lead.

After a 43-yard field goal from Fera, TCU answered on a double pass, with quarterback Casey Pachall throwing a backwards screen to wide receiver Cameron Echols-Luper, who then threw to LaDarius Brown for a 38-yard touchdown. Texas countered two drives later when McCoy dropped back on a third-and-10 and hit Johnson in stride down the sideline for a 65-yard touchdown.

McCoy's second long strike of the game occurred when he hit Mike Davis on a 44-yard pass with six seconds left in the first half. That set up a 37-yard field goal by Fera, giving the Longhorns a 20-7 lead at the half.

On their first possession of the second half, the Longhorns went 89 yards on eight plays to go ahead 27-7. The Longhorns let their defense take it from there as they continued to dominate TCU for the remainder of the game.

Brown rushed 20 times for 119 yards, Case McCoy went 20 of 29 for 196 yards, and Jaxon Shipley posted 77 yards on six receptions.

Cedric Reed provided constant pressure for the Texas defensive front, recording three tackles for a loss and two sacks. The junior defensive end also forced the fumble that Whaley scored on. Dalton Santos led the defense with eight tackles, while Steve Edmond and Jackson Jeffcoat had six apiece.

Texas was balanced offensively once again with 221 rushing yards and 197 passing yards.

Early in the game, Texas struck first on its longest drive of the season, going 92 yards on eight plays, culminated with Brown punching it in from two yards out to make it 7-0.

The Longhorns then went ahead 14-0 with a seven-play, 56-yard drive, capped by a three yard run by Brown.

Brown would add two more scores, from 1 and 30 yards out respectively, and along with Whaley's fumble recovery, Texas mounted a 35-6 lead.

KU notched two field goals early in the contest, making the score as close as 14-6, but after that, the Texas defense held strong until late in the game when Montell Cozart had a 20-yard touchdown, making the score 35-13, which proved to be the final.

MORGANTOWN, W. VA — Case McCoy hit Alex De La Torre for a 2-yard touchdown pass in overtime and Texas knocked off West Virginia, 47-40, in a back-and-forth affair in Morgantown.

Texas linebacker Steve Edmond twice prevented West Virginia from the equalizing score in overtime -- first tipping a pass in the end zone on third down, and then intercepting Mountaineer quarterback Paul Millard in the end zone on fourth down to seal the win.

McCoy went 27 of 49 for 283 yards and three touchdowns and the Texas defense forced five turnovers in a game that featured seven lead changes. Jaxon Shipley caught seven passes for 82 yards and a touchdown, and Malcolm Brown ran 28 times for 89 yards and a score.

Edmond, who had a career- and team-high 12 tackles on the night, was part of a defensive effort that recorded six sacks and 10 tackles for loss. The Longhorns also forced four fumbles -- recovering three -- and had two interceptions. In the first half, West Virginia blocked a punt for a safety and turned the ensuing drive into a touchdown for an early 9-0 lead and stretched their lead to 19-13 at the half with a 30-yard field goal as time expired.

The two sides traded scores throughout the second half, turning the 19-13 West Virginia lead at halftime into a seesaw affair.

Texas sent the game into overtime when Anthony Fera booted his fourth field goal of the game, a 24-yarder with 13 seconds left in regulation.

McCoy connected with Shipley for 9 yards on a fourth-and-7 to prolong the drive, and Brown had a 27-yard run to setup the game-tying field goal by Fera.

Desmond Jackson and Cedric Reed both finished the game with two sacks, while Jackson Jeffcoat had one.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Quarterback Clint Chelf went 16 of 22 for 197 yards through the air and ran for another 95 yards with two scores to lead the No. 12/10 Oklahoma State past No. 23/24 Texas.

Case McCoy went 26 of 39 for 221 yards for the Longhorns, but threw three interceptions that led to 14 points for the Cowboys, as Texas had its six-game winning streak snapped despite holding a 389-380 advantage in total yards of offense.

Though Texas fell behind early, the Longhorns used a heavy dose of Malcolm Brown and Joe Bergeron to stay close much of the first half and Texas trailed just 14-10 after Brown's 7-yard touchdown run with 3:39 left.

Oklahoma State answered, however, when wide receiver Tracy Moore caught a 12-yard touchdown pass from Chelf that deflected off safety Adrian Phillips' hand with 1:15 left in the first half. Then with 18 seconds left, McCoy was intercepted by Justin Gilbert who returned it 43 yards down the sideline for a touchdown to make it 28-10.

On the opening drive of the second half Texas marched down to the OSU 10-yard line. But the drive stalled and the Longhorns had to settle for a 27-yard field goal from Anthony Fera.

Oklahoma State responded with a field goal of its own on the ensuing drive, and Texas was unable to move the ball on offense its next five drives.

Oklahoma State picked off McCoy for the second time late in the third quarter when Caleb Lavey intercepted a short pass over the middle. One play later, Chelf hit Moore for a 21-yard score to make it 38-13.

Field position played a major role in the game. The Longhorns started inside their own 20-yard line on seven possessions and inside their 35 on all 14 possessions.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Malcolm Brown and Joe Bergeron both topped 100 rushing yards. Texas' defense had a season-high nine sacks, and the Longhorns ran past Texas Tech 41-16 Thanksgiving night.

Brown ran for 128 yards on 27 carries and Bergeron had 102 yards on 17.

After falling behind early when Texas Tech turned a fake punt into a 51-yard touchdown, the Longhorns controlled much of the game.

The defensive line provided constant pressure. Jackson Jeffcoat tallied a career-high three sacks, vaulting himself into the school's career top 10 in that category. Cedric Reed had two, and the Longhorns had nine total sacks on the night.

Quarterback Case McCoy went 10 of 19 for 139 yards and accounted for three touchdowns — two passing to Mike Davis and a 1-yard run. Davis burned the Red Raiders by finishing with 112 yards on four receptions, including the two TDs.

The Longhorns built a 20-10 halftime lead behind touchdowns from Bergeron and Davis and two field goals from Anthony Fera, one of 20 seniors making their final appearance at Darrell K Royal-Texas Memorial Stadium.

Leading 20-10 at halftime, the Longhorns put the game away in the third quarter scoring another touchdown on their first drive and then shut down the Tech offense for the remainder of the quarter. Texas increased its lead to 34-10 when Davis caught a 7-yard touchdown pass from McCoy with 14:56 left in the fourth quarter.

Backup quarterback Tyrone Swoopes scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard run with 4:22 remaining in the game to extend the lead to 41-16.

Texas also used some trickery to help move the ball down the field in the first half as Jaxon Shiple took a reverse from Brown, then threw downfield and hit Davis in stride for a 43-yard gain.

WACO, TEXAS — Malcolm Brown ran for 131 yards and Texas' defense kept Baylor's high-powered offense off the scoreboard for much of the game, but quarterback Bryce Petty threw two second half touchdowns to lead the No. 9/7 Bears to a 30-10 win.

Playing for an outright Big 12 championship after Oklahoma knocked off Oklahoma State earlier in the day, Brown and the No. 23/24 Longhorns established the run game in the first half and were tied with the Bears, 3-3, at halftime.

But Petty led a 14-play, 77-yard touchdown drive to open the second half, then followed with another scoring drive after Texas went three-and-out, to give the Bears a 17-3 lead with 6:54 left in the third quarter.

After Baylor's Aaron Jones kicked a 42-yard field goal that made it 20-7, Jaxon Shiple returned a punt 50 yards that set the Longhorns up with possession at the Baylor 11-yard line.

Case McCoy then converted a fourth-and-goal when he scrambled in the pocket and found Brown in the end zone for a 2-yard score that made it 20-10 early in the fourth quarter.

Baylor, though, answered with 9:18 left in the game on another field goal from Jones.

The Bears, put the game out of reach after intercepting McCoy with 4:09 to play, setting up an 18-yard touchdown run by Glasco Martin. Baylor ended the game with 509 total yards, including 277 in the second half.

The Longhorns limited Baylor to 62 rushing yards on 19 carries in the first half, while holding the Bears scoreless on their final six possessions of the half.

The Longhorns knotted it up at 3 with 4:31 left in the first half when Fera drilled a 42-yard field goal following a 10-play, 47-yard drive. Brown accounted for 32 yards on the drive.
